#### **Committee Reports**

#### Horticulture Therapy- Cheryl Williams (Canterbury GC), Chairman

**Hanover Towne GC** made 75 arrangements on December 8, 2024, for Health Care and Assisted Living units in Covenant Woods.

**Woodland Pond GC** made 55 small flower arrangements on January 16, 2025, and delivered them to Chester Senior Living Apartments.

#### Horticulture- Jackie McDonnough (Oxford GC), Chairman

#### Ginger: Easy to Cultivate and Rewarding

- 1. Purchase ginger root. Try to buy organically grown or wash to remove growth suppressor from non-organic ginger.
- 2. Cut root into 1-1.5-inch pieces, with 1 or 2 knobby buds on each piece. Allow pieces to cure over a few days before planting.
- 3. Plant the pieces in a 12-inch clay pot with nutrient-rich potting mix and keep the soil moist but not too wet. Plant one piece per pot.
- 4. Keep the plants at about 68 degrees in direct sunlight and apply fertilizer once every few weeks. You can transplant to an outside bed or keep in pot.
- 5. Harvest when it's 8-10 months old, digging up the entire plant, trim off the shoots, and saving some root chunks for replanting.
- 6. Enjoy in teas, homemade ginger beer or world cuisines.

#### Recipe

#### **Ginger Lemonade**

31/2 cups of water (Divided)

½ cup agave syrup (plus more to taste)

2/3 cup chopped fresh ginger, peeling optional (organic when possible)

1 cup lemon juice (5 lemons yield~ 1 cup of juice)

For garnish fresh mint leaves

#### Instructions

- 1. In a small saucepan, combine ½ cup of water, the agave and the chopped ginger. Bring to a simmer over medium heat. Once simmering, cook for 10 minutes to extract the ginger flavor. Remove from heat.
- 2. Meanwhile, to a glass jar or pitcher add lemon juice and remaining water. Place a strainer over the jar/lemon mixture and pass the ginger syrup through it, removing any small pieces of ginger. Wisk the lemonade well to mix in ginger syrup and serve it over ice. Optionally, garnish with fresh mint leaves.
- 3. Lemonade will keep in a second container in the refrigerator up to 5 days, or freeze popsicle molds for a sweet, cold treat! Can also be frozen into ice cubes and added to summer beverages.

#### **CANTERBURY GARDEN CLUB**

Four years ago, we started collecting plastic wrap for our TREX initiative of removing plastic from the ecosystem. This has allowed us to provide garden benches to our school garden project (TWICE!!) and to our church where we meet. So far this year we have collected 682 lbs. toward our goal of 1000 lbs.

We are excited to reveal we have a recipient for our next bench. There is an enslaved cemetery in Hanover that has fallen in disrepair since the 1950's. A woman, who is 87, is spearheading volunteers to clean up the grounds and the few remaining headstones and flag graves through depressions in the ground that no longer have headstones. She has an enslaved ancestor buried there also. It is called Hickory Hill cemetery and sits on 4 1/2 acres of private land. She would love to receive a bench so that relatives and friends could visit the cemetery with a place to sit. ## RICHMOND COUNCIL OF GARDEN CLUBS, INC REGULAR MEETING, February 7, 2025
